Happy Friday, Farm Friends!

It's a beautiful morning at the farm -- the sun is shining and there's just a nip in the air. With the morning temperatures in the mid-50s, the windows aren't open as wide as they have been and no fans are blowing in cooler air. Fall is definitely on the way -- the light is at a different angle now and we need headlamps to finish up our evening chores. Farming -- or any kind of outside work -- gives you the opportunity to really observe these changes. By being outside most of the day, one becomes much more aware of the passing of the seasons. That's one of the great things about farming!



Way Cool!

Another great thing about farming is having things to fix and a I-o-n-g list of projects (Mr. Fix-It's dream job!). Some days it's greater than others! One of this week's projects is putting in a new cooling unit for our walk-in cooler. Our walk-in is an Army surplus field cooler built in 1982. We purchased it in 2011 and it has been running almost nonstop since then.

A neat thing about our walk-in is that the cooling unit is not the typical cooler. Most traditional walk-ins have large coolers that use lots of coolant and electricity, have lots of fans and need a lot of space -- and are extremely expensive to buy and run! We use a basic window air conditioner fitted with something called a "CoolBot". The <u>Coolbot</u> is a controller that bypasses the air conditioner's temperature controls and will let the air conditioner lower the temperature to 34 degrees. It's pretty neat technology!

Our system has worked great for 10 years but the air conditioning unit needed to be replaced. It was a bit undersized when we installed it and the load of working so much over the past decade was beginning to take its toll. The good news is that we will be able to use the AC unit in our new walk-in at the Star since it won't require such a low temperature and will be in a more sheltered environment.

So with our new AC unit in hand and an electrical upgrade, Ray and the team went to work to get the old unit out and the new one in. We're halfway there now and hopefully by this afternoon, the cooler will be humming again!
