Interesting week around the farm. We started it off on Sunday with our first Covid scare (1 employee positive, the rest of us tested negative) We are grateful that the employee that had Covid had a fairly mild case and will be able to return work next week. And we are also very happy that the rest of us were negative! Whew -- what a relief!

But in the meantime, we got the rest of the strawberries planted and even added a bed of kale for good measure. First, Ray had to finish up burning the holes in the landscape fabric. The really high winds that we've been having over the past week have been creating extra challenges with things like burning holes or laying landscape fabric or stretching out big sails of fabric! We finally got a bit of calm on Sunday so it was go-time.



You might was well have some fun while you are working on a Sunday, right?



Here Jonny and Cheryl are finishing up planting the last of the strawberries on Wednesday. We have the beds covered in a field blanket not only as a protection from the cold but mostly as a protection from deer. Deer are much less likely to go after a crop that is covered than they will a crop that is not -especially something like strawberries.

The field blanket is a stand-in for the high tunnel that will be constructed over the planting sometime this winter. We are adding another large high tunnel to our mix (34' x 96') and it will be perfect for strawberries, tomatoes and more! We are grateful for the support of the <u>Natural Resources and</u> <u>Conservation Service</u> (NRCS) and their <u>EQIP High Tunnel System</u> <u>Initiative</u>. Thanks to their cost share support, we'll be able to build this tunnel to help us produce crops that are more climate resilient.

NRCS along with <u>Stokes Soil and Water Conservation District</u> have both been important partners ever since we moved back to the farm in 2009. Their support has been very instrumental in helping us improve the quality of the soil and water and to help us become better stewards of the land.
