Sorry that the newsletter is running a bit late today! We had a project that required all hands on deck. We were covering one of our caterpillar tunnels since our plan is to seed carrots there next week. In farming, it's essential to stick with your schedule, especially when you've got rain or snow on the way.





This tunnel (Tabby) was damaged in a storm in late 2020 and we removed the cover last January. Since we needed more covered space for crops, it was time to get it buttoned back up. A good thing about this process is that it gave us the opportunity to make some design tweaks to the structure. Ray, Jonny and Alex moved the hipboards (the horizontal board that runs along the side of the high tunnel) up about 10 inches. This will let us roll up the sides more to allow better ventilation. More ventilation is always good especially in the summer!



Although we still have some fine-tuning to do, we were able to get Tabby completely covered. Hooray! Big Check Mark! And since Jonny has already prepped some gorgeous beds, Cheryl is anxious to take the seeder out for its first spin of 2022!

Getting Growing!

The greenhouse is starting to kick into gear for its super busy season. On Monday, we got about a 1/3 of the house thoroughly cleaned and sanitized. Even though we are diligent about trying to keep the greenhouse floor swept, it's amazing how much soil and moss builds up. Thanks to Jonny, Alex and Amanda, the floor is clean, and the benches and heat mats are spic and span and are ready to go for seed trays!



Well, that didn't take long...!



Cheryl got the first round of seeds in trays (several thousand seeds of shallots, bunching onions, kale -- and even some early tomatoes) and quickly filled up the first set of heat mats!

Greenhouse time and seeding is one of Cheryl's happy places. There is something so magical about a tiny seed growing into a huge, strong plant! Working at the potting bench, she is frequently joined by Detroit, her seeding buddy.
