Hasn't it been a glorious few days? We have been soaking up the sunshine as we work through our to-do list. It has been such a pleasant contrast to so much of this winter weather.

Even the bees were out and about. We haven't seen much activity in the hive in a couple of months.



It seems like this winter has been a struggle for everything. Even the garlic has been buffeted by the cold and wind -- we've never seen it look so sad. But the good news is that new leaves are emerging, and it doesn't look quite as rough.



Yes, we are all looking forward to warmer, sunny days -- although as farmers, we do get a bit panicked when we realize that March is just around the corner! There's so much Winter Work still left to do!!

This week we got our early spring order from <u>Seven Springs Farm Supply</u>. We coordinate bulk orders with local farmers and gardeners to help us all get better prices on soil amendments and supplies. And given how these prices (and

A popular item that we get is fish emulsion. Our favorite product is <u>Brown's</u> <u>Fish Fertilizer</u> which is based in Western North Carolina. They make a great product that uses trout by-products (keeping them from the landfill) and turns them into liquid fertilizer. It's the modern version of what the Native Americans taught the Pilgrims.

We buy the fish in a 55-gallon drum (don't try this at home!) and then pump it out into smaller containers. Sometimes it can be a bit tricky when we get to the bottom of the barrel!



In other Farm happenings....



It was time to dig the blackberry volunteers out of the nursery so that we can pot them up for our Plant Sales. We'll have lots of beautiful organic Triple Crown plants for you later in the spring!



Haircut Time! The bulb onions got a trim -- this helps the plants grow stronger and will help them put more energy into the roots. They will be planted out in March and harvested this summer.

LOTS of greenhouse this work this week! Amanda and Alex got all of the seed trays and pots washed and stored (HUGE thanks!). Ray potted up ginger plantlets and Cheryl got more seeding done. The greenhouse and the germination chamber are really filling up!
