
Want to grow better blackberries and raspberries? Check out our upcoming workshop - it's this Sunday, May 15. Details below.

## Other Berries in the Spotlight, Too!

Last Friday, after the first wave of tornado warnings (!), Ray, Sophie and Elise got a new bed of raspberries planted. These raspberries (Joan J) have a lucious flavor and are the earlist of the fall raspberries. They produce shortly

after the Triple Crown blackberries in late July. We have two beds of Prelude already and wanted to amp up production with another variety.

The weather was perfect for planting -- cool and the soil was nicely moist after the rain. They got that task knocked out in less than 1 hour -- 108 baby raspberries all tucked in! We look forward to tasting the fruits of our labor come next July.





The blackberries definitely need to get their props as well. Our planting of Osage is doing extremely well and looks to be on target for producing in mid-June. The plants were covered in blankets of light pink flowers a couple of weeks ago and now the flowers have become green berries. Fingers crossed for a big harvest! Last year we lost the entire Osage crop due to the late April freeze.





## Wanna Know More? Two Workshops to Help You Grow Better!

Our workshop on growing brambles -- blackberries, raspberries and black raspberries. -- is right around the corner. "Growing the Jewels of the Garden" is a 2-part workshop. The first one is on Sunday, May 15 from 2-4:30. It will focus on the different types of cane fruits as well as the planting, trellising and tending of blackberries and raspberries in the spring and summer. The second session (late summer/early fall date TBD) will help you get your brambles ready for winter and a successful spring. The workshops will be hands-on and will give you the confidence you need to have success with these wonderful fruits. You do not need to participate in both workshops but there is a discount if you do. The cost for both sessions is \$50; the cost for a single session is \$35. Click here to register.



The second workshop is on growing Ginger. It's been a few years since we have offered this class and there has been a growing (pun intended!) interest in this crop. We've got lots of experience growing this sometimes temperamental rhizome and you can benefit from our trials and errors. ## **Fields of Dreams**

Farming in the spring is great. It's not too hot, the pests and disease haven't made it to the party yet, and the farm looks so pretty. Let's look at some of our favorite fields right now...



The garlic field is stunning. Those 12,000\_ bulbs of garlic are doing incredibly well. Spring garlic season has moved into garlic scapes (just beginning) and fresh garlic will be here before you know it. The bulbs are enormous! Here is an Inchelium Red with a small pocketknife at its base to show how big the stem

is -- and this is not the biggest one!



Peas are on the way! Our planting of both sugar snap peas and snow peas are loving this cooler weather. The plants are loaded with pods, and they are starting to get Plum Granny plump!






And finally the Brassica field (kale, cabbage, Asian greens, pac choi, sprouting broccoli and kohlrabi) is looking mighty good -- although the cabbage looper moths (those little white fluttering things!) are finding the plants. And we can't forget the other Alliums -- bulbing onions, bunching onions and shallots -- they're strutting their stuff too!





That's the news for this week. Sunday night (actually early Monday morning) will see May's full moon. The <u>Full Flower Moon</u> will be at peak illumination at 12:15 a.m. on Monday. In addition to being a full moon, there will also be a total lunar eclipse. Keep your fingers crossed that we have clear skies for the evening to watch all of these astronomical wonders.
