


Happy Friday, Farm Friends! Happy June!

## Flowers of the Field

One of the benefits of haying season is that you get walk through fields that you don't normally travel. One of those areas is below the greenhouse. Thanks to Ray's care and artful mowing, we have been able to preserve a beautiful patch of native *asclepias tuberosa* or butterfly weed. It is such a glorious blaze of color and is a beacon to butterflies, bees and other pollinators. I'm glad that Ray agrees that we just couldn't mow it down!





Flip, Flip, Plant, Plant

We are at that stage of the season when it is time to get out many of our early season crops -- mostly cool season brassicas like mustards, collards, broccoli, etc. -- and replace them with warm season plants like tomatoes and peppers. We've been making good progress this week on finishing the "flip." Elise was able to knock out the majority of the planting on Monday and Wednesday this week -- about 400 tomato plants and 200 sweet peppers! You

## Crop Report!

Some of our warmer season crops are starting to produce -- squash, tomatoes and it's almost time for GARLIC harvest! We'll start on that one next week!



Flowers are also starting to pop up everywhere. We're a bit behind on our annual plantings but the perennials are strutting their stuff.



That's all we've got for this week, Friends. There's a Full Moon rising on Tuesday. The <u>Strawberry Full Moon</u> will reach peak illumination on Tuesday morning at 7:52 a.m. but will be best seen that evening as it rises from the Southeast.
