Testing...1,2,3.....

It's soil testing time! Every couple of years, we take soil samples from all of our fields, high tunnels and raised beds (even our hay fields) and send them off to the <u>NC Department of Agriculture Agronomic Lab</u> for analysis of our soil composition and nutrients. This is an important part of managing our soil health and provides guidance regarding what is needed for soil amendments. We are

fortunate in North Carolina because we are able to get soil tests FREE from April through November. There is a fee (\$4 per sample) from December through March. Sample boxes and forms are available at your local Extension office.



We use the state labs a lot. In addition to soil testing, you can also get media tests of potting mixes or compost (very useful information!). The <u>Plant Disease</u> and Insect Clinic at NC State is also a huge help to us. They have helped us diagnose all kinds of diseases and pests.

We always advise backyard gardeners to go to their local Extension agent for questions -- especially if you are dealing with plant disease or pest issues. They can be a huge help! When we first started farming here, it was hard to get information geared to organic growing from Extension ("you can't grow strawberries organically," we were told) but that is starting to change. One of the most <u>comprehensive sources of information</u> for organic growers comes from Debbie Roos at the Chatham County Extension office. Check out this amazing resource!

You Guys Crack Us Up!


