


But of course, now we are back to unseasonably warm temperatures -- we were in the mid- to upper 60s this week! Go figure!

Garlic? Done!

Our last planned task before the Christmas break was to get the garlic planted. And we made good on that plan. The last bulbs went into the ground on the Solstice, and it was indeed a cause for celebration. The completion was especially sweet since we had so many setbacks in getting it done.

The final count was 6,798. Much smaller than what we have had in the past, but it was what we could get done given the conditions. As it stands, garlic is planted in 3 different fields!

Also before the flip of the calendar, we were doing some work on our ginger crop. Our partnership with <u>Dr. Gouchen Yang at NC A&T</u> is such a blessing. We learn so much from his team's research, and this year they are evaluating a test plot of ginger that we grew for them in our greenhouse. Two of Dr. Yang's graduate students, William and Daniel, harvested our test bags and collected data on the crop -- weight, size and other characteristics. The rhizomes will also be analyzed to determine their gingerol content and other properties.

The harvest was pretty good - despite it being planted on the late side. We are looking forward to learning more about the results of their research!







Another benefit of our work with Dr. Yang is being able to visit his laboratory and greenhouse to learn more about what he is doing to support small farmers in NC and elsewhere. Ray recently stopped by for a visit to get some tips from Dr. Yang so that we would be ready for his grad students.





Seed Time!

When the calendar flips, we getting into seeding mode! This week, the first seed went into trays in the greenhouse. It was quickly followed by 6,768 of its closest friends! Boy, these numbers add up quickly!

Any guesses about what we are seeding first?



Onions! I'm not sure why the first crop we seed each year has tiny black seeds which are placed on dark seed starting mix! I always start getting a bit cross-eyed by the end of the first day.



And with all these seed trays and plants, WE NEED MORE ROOM!



And it is beginning! Our long-delayed greenhouse expansion is finally taking (more) shape -- the first bow went up yesterday! Ray has figured out a better (and safer) way to connect the bows to the posts so setting them will be easier and faster. We hope to get several more bows and purlins installed today and then we will begin on the hipboards and other parts of the structure. The magic will be when we take the cover off the existing part of the greenhouse so that we can cover the old and the new as one 96' building! So exciting!
