## **Weeding Works Wonders!**

Another key winter task is to get the bramble beds weeded and pruned. This week we started that process - taking advantage of a bit of sun. We started with our primocane raspberries by weeding the beds and cutting off the canes.





Next we'll weed and prune the floricane raspberries. They aren't quite as easy because we're pruning, not simply cutting off all of the canes. But since we are cutting out the canes that produced fruit last year, it's not too hard to do.

We also took a minute to clear the remaining three flower beds in our front yard. Jonny and Elise were real troopers working in the drizzle and rain. They were able to divide a big patch of irises that had spread w-a-y beyond the bed's boundaries. The good news is that we were able to get some really nice rhizomes from the plants. These beautiful deep purple irises are all potted up and will be available at our <u>plant sale</u> this Spring!





It's not all playing in the dirt -- sometimes it's concrete too! Ray has been wanting to replace the ramp at the storage building (aka the Star), and we finally took care of it. First came the not so easy step of breaking up the existing concrete. Thanks to a concrete saw, a sledgehammer and strong backs, the job got done.







Than came the easier, but more exacting process of building the new ramp. Jonny and Ray were on that task too!
