Happy Friday, Farm Friends! Hay there!



Yep. It's that time of year again -- time for the fall hay cutting. Although the grass isn't as thick and lush as spring, it still results in good quality hay for our animals. This year, we've been able to get several cuttings and will have a good supply. We have fewer mouths to feed this winter (sniff!), but the cows alone go through about 500 bales!



Working on our pastures to get them even more productive is on the fall and winter to-do list. Over-seeding, lime and fertilizer are all things that need to be done to improve yield. As one of the few Organic hay growers in the state, we always have more folks interested in the crop than what we have available.

Flip, Plant, Repeat!

We continue our workout regimen of pulling out spent crops and putting in new ones. This is an ongoing process for a small market farm as it's important to keep our growing spaces in production so that we have crops for our customers. It always seems like we are running behind schedule, so it feels good when things get in on time -- or mostly.

One of the raised beds we have tucked between 2 of our high tunnels is a high value space. So far this year, it's been home to carrots, beets and a failed crop of summer spinach. Now it sports a crop of transplanted pac choi, tatsoi and mustards. What a transformation!

We've also been harvesting lots of beautiful produce lately -- our peppers have really started coming in (green chile will be available soon!) and the eggplant, tomatoes and okra are spectacular!



And we can't forget our cucumbers! The "Net House" that Ray constructed around the plants is doing a great job of reducing our pest pressure. The plants are doing incredibly well and are starting to provide us with some pretty good yields. I think we have a new technique that's a keeper.
