The final count was 7,805. We have a few hundred cloves of spring garlic to pop in another field, but the "real" crop is in! Hallelujah!

Work on our "big dog" high tunnel continues. This week's goal is to get all of the purlins and wind braces up before the deluge and heavy winds (current forecast shows about 4.5 inches between Saturday and Tuesday's rain/snow events!).

This morning's 18-degree start made for some mighty frosty steel. But the show must go on, right?





We are on a path to get this tunnel ready to cover by the 1st of February -gotta make it happen because tomatoes are going in there by March 1st! And to get tomatoes in the ground by March 1st, they have to get seeded NOW. Mission accomplished! And the seedlings are already beginning to pop!



Next up, onions!

I'm not sure why one of the first crops we seed each year has tiny black seeds which are placed on dark seed starting mix. I always start getting a bit crosseyed by the end of the first day.




