Hope you fared okay with last weekend's cold and wind!



Hasn't it been wonderful to see this sight today? It feels like it has been weeks since we've seen the sun -- but actually it's just been since Monday. Obviously, I was never cut out for a life in the Pacific Northwest!







Despite the weather, it's been a productive week. It started out with Jonny and Elise getting the 2 beds of Osage blackberries weeded. These two were on a mission to get it done in one day! Don't get in the way of a woman with a Cape Cod weeder!



I think I heard a sigh of relief from the plants!





Taking care of the weeds in the beds is an important step in brambles care. We were running a bit behind in getting it done. Soon we'll be mowing the raspberry canes to get them set up for berries in the late summer.

Also on the list this week was getting the greenhouse floor cleared and sanitized so that we can make repairs to the landscape fabric. The floors definitely take a beating, so they need to be repaired every few years. This was their year!





And just like that, Jonny and Elise got a large chunk of it done!



Another priority for the week included potting up the early tomato plants. They were seeded at the end of December and have grown like gangbusters. Now they've got room to stretch out and put on more roots. These plants will go into the new high tunnel (Lil' Abner) on March 1. Tomatoes in mid-June? Yes, please!



So, what do farmers do in the winter? In addition to planning, bookkeeping, seeding, and ordering supplies, one of the key tasks is maintenance. Equipment and structures work hard during the main season,

and they need a little TLC. One item that's been on the list for a while was to replace the tines on the tiller for the walk-behind tractor (Grillo). Are we a bit premature in replacing them? Yikes!





Yet another item to repair were the doors on the Tabby high tunnel. These scissor doors have always been a bit of a challenge to open and close. The icing on the cake was when some of the super gusts of wind we had back in December ripped the plastic on the door completely in half. A good time to take care of all of these issues! Now that it's fixed, we'll be able to get our carrots and spinach seeded in there in a couple of weeks.





While we tackle our to-do lists, the garlic is doing what it does best -- grow! We're getting lots of green shoots popping up all over the field!
