The arrival of Spring is getting soooo close! And with the warm, wet days we've been having, things are really starting to pop.

We do always get a bit nervous when the peach starts blooming -- that usually means there's a freeze on the way. Who knows if this will be another year that we'll need to cover it. It's quite an endeavor!

Now that the big push to build Lil' Abner is behind us, we're getting fields ready for planting. Jonny and Elise tackled South 1 by raking off the plant debris so that we can remove the fabric and prepare the soil for planting.



The **cucumbers** in the greenhouse are really taking off. Ray trellised them on Wednesday, and we already have teeny lil' cukes and flowers!





It was time to give the garlic its first weeding. The landscape fabric is definitely doing its job of discouraging weeds -- although weeds still pop up in the holes the cloves were planted in. But it is <u>so</u> much easier than trying to weed the entire field!





The Potatoes are here! We got our order of seed potatoes in from our favorite vendor, <u>The Maine Potato</u> <u>Lady</u>! Seven hundred pounds of beautiful spuds! Ray is working on getting the field ready so we can get these babies in the ground as soon as possible. Meanwhile, they're hanging out in the walk-in so they don't break dormancy.
