We've been trying to make like a Zinnia this week at the farm. Maintaining a perky outlook while we are parched and hot and the bugs are starting to get to us. You know, just another rainless, hot day!

We don't recall seeing the yard as dry as it has been this summer. The only thing growing in the lawn are Plum Granny plants! The miracle of natives!



But the good news is that we did get a bit of rain Wednesday evening. That 2/10 of an inch had a lot of ground to cover. It seems that everywhere around us has gotten a lot of rain, but our friend, Sauratown Moutain, has protected us from the storms -- and rain. Fingers crossed for this weekend and the coming week when it looks like we might get rain every day!

Clean Up in Field 1!

Raz 1 is our largest growing area. It is a permaculture area -- home to all of our blackberries, raspberries, apple trees and muscadines. In addition to these plantings, there is a tremendous amount of grass. All this grass is very nice for pick-your-own events or even just for us -- until it gets totally overgrown. That's what happened this year. Both our sickle mower and lawn mower were broken, and we fell w-a-y behind in mowing. It was really bad!

But over the last couple of weeks, Ray has been mowing with the now-repaired equipment. He got the tallest vegetation cut down with the sickle mower and he could then use the lawn mower to tidy up a bit more.


