Happy Saturday, Farm Friends!

We're a little off schedule this week -- trying to balance the hip rehab with farm stuff -- oh yeah, and the Organic Inspection! Things got a little discombobulated.



Our <u>American Beautyberry</u> (*Callicarpa americana*) shows off its lovely fruit. This sweet plant is still waiting to be planted in the yard -- but that will be a good winter task. This native plant is a member of the Mint family (a whiff of its fragrant leaves will hint at that fact), and it grows well in our area. We purchased our plant at Cobblestone from <u>Bashavia Gardens</u> -- they specialize in plants that are native to our area. I'm looking forward to seeing this beauty grow and flourish in our yard. Bonus: they are supposed to repel deer -- maybe we should surround the farm with these bushes!

We're getting into a different seasonal rhythm here at the farm. Since we're not harvesting or tending crops like we were last month, we can now focus on getting ready for another season.



Clearing the fields and high tunnels of plant material is a priority. We don't want to create cozy environments for pests and create a problem for next year. And we also want to be able to add compost and manure to the beds to boost the nutrients and organic matter of the soil.

The timing on this is critical because the National Organic Program has very <u>specific rules</u> <u>regarding the use of manure</u> in vegetable production. Manure must be incorporated into the soil at least 90 or 120 days before harvest, depending on the type of crop. Yes -- we want to feed the soil, and we want to do it with food safety as the utmost priority!

It is always hard to see our lush, productive plantings turn into crispy, dead plants. :-(But getting it all cleaned up, moves us closer to being ready for a new year! It's a cycle -- every ending is the beginning of something new.



One bonus of cleaning up Ajo, Jonny collected zillions of marigold seeds! We'll scatter them in some pollinator strips next year and use them for seed-starting for the Plant Sale!



Mr. Fix-It's Dream Job!



In the Winter, farmers get a chance to take care of all the things that couldn't be done in the Summer. All Summer long we'll look at something that needs to be improved or repaired, and we'll say, "That's a Winter project." Well, winter is here (almost!)

Ray and Jonny were able to take advantage of Friday's milder weather to repair the little bump-out storage on the greenhouse (we call it "The Confessional" because that's kinda what it looks like!). During Helene, the wind ripped the roof off this structure and water had penetrated it pretty badly. While working on this, Ray could see how badly rotten the exterior plywood is on the greenhouse. Another opportunity to use those fix-it skills!

Visit with Santa Ginger

The Holiday Spirit was on great display when Ray paid a visit to Dr. Gouchen Yang and his team at NC A&T University. Dr. Yang invited Ray to come by to pick up some ginger from their harvest this fall -- and what a haul it was! Thanks, Santa Ginger!

of years ago, we got several hundred of them right around the beginning of January!



Organic Inspection Update!

We met with the Organic Inspector on Tuesday and we are happy to report that everything went well. There were no findings, and the inspector seemed to think our records and farm were in good order! Whew!

The inspector doesn't give us a pass or fail -- he or she simply asks the questions, inspects the fields and buildings, collects the data and prepares a report for our certifier. Our certifier will then notify us of their determination. Feeling optimistic about the outcome!
