## Happy Friday, Farm Friends!

'Tis the season for more than one Flower of the Week -- I just can't choose especially from flowers with such special histories!



This is one of my Mom's roses that she probably planted about 35 years ago. It has such beautiful blooms and churns out hundreds of flowers every season. The flowers always make me think of her.



This stunning white lilac has a very long history. Our plant comes from Ray's Grandma Erickson's lilac bush in Lindsborg, Kansas. Cuttings moved from there to Ray's Mom's in Springfield, VA, to our house in Vienna, VA, then to Albuquerque to here. Whew! That's one well-travelled plant!



This azalea is the last remaining bush of several which were transplanted from a dear family friend in Rural Hall. IW Bunn (known as Bunny), was a master plant propagator. He gave my Dad azaleas, rhododendron, and cherry laurel-- and probably a lot more.

#### **An Ounce of Prevention**

We have been struggling with a severe infestation of <u>whiteflies</u> in the greenhouse this season. We've had them before but never like this! A cloud of them would emerge from the tomatoes and pepper transplants if you brushed the leaves.

We've been using organic methods to knock down the population -- <u>yellow sticky</u> <u>cards</u> and <u>neem oil</u> (Azadiracthin) -- and it has taken a lot to get the population under control.

This weekend, I was getting some seed trays out of storage and stopped to pull a few wild prickly lettuce weeds. When I looked down, I noticed that the plant was covered in whiteflies! Could it be that this plant is an attractant for them and was it the source of our problem?

The weeds were right by the greenhouse door, so we needed to prevent them from coming back. Since we don't spray weed killers, landscape fabric was the solution. Jonny and Ray got the fabric installed so we now have a 4' buffer between the lawn and the greenhouse. Easy to mow and maintain.



We know that it's important to keep the areas around your growing spaces trimmed but sometimes things get out of hand (life, right?) It's not just whiteflies -- grasshoppers, cabbage loopers and other undesirables enjoy weeds. By eliminating them near the greenhouse (or garden), we've taken a step to reduce our pest population. This is all part of <a href="Integrated Pest Management">Integrated Pest Management</a> (IPM)

### Is Timmy in the Well?

Besides pests, water is something that also requires our attention. Our irrigation system is far better than it used to be. We have hydrants in strategic locations along with underground irrigation boxes that allow us to connect lines to various fields and high tunnels. You wouldn't believe what a hodgepodge it was just a few years ago!

And it's all been great -- until one of the hydrants froze. On the subject of prevention, make sure to drain all of your hoses and water sources when there's a freeze predicted. In this case, we didn't do that, and the hydrant burst. Not good.

So, we have been without water at a very key spot -- for 2 years. Until this week! Ray and Jonny excavated the 3' hole (along with all the pea gravel) and got to work installing the replacement.

Despite the fact that we were accusing Ray of laying down on the job, he adroitly got the plumbing together. And we've got water again!





Let's take a peek at some of what else we've been up to this week, shall we?



The early season tomatoes got their first pruning this week. And Ray got his first case of "Tomato Hands."

The Snow Peas and some of the Snap Peas finally have flowers!! These were planted on February 5th.

World's. Slowest. Peas. Ever.





Our greenhouse pepper experiment seems to be going well. We've got fruit!



The Galahad tomatoes are also setting a lot of fruit -- won't be long!
